WHEN SEARCH ENGINES DON'T WORK Finding Online Sources That Are Not Digitally Indexed Speaker: Marge Bell

The records of the Family History Library in Salt Lake City are being digitized at an amazing rate. This includes the millions of microfilms and microfiche previously available only in the SLC library or by mail order through your local FHC. It also includes the thousands upon thousands of periodicals indexed in PERSI.

This presentation by lecture and demonstration will explain how to find and use these online records which *cannot be found* by doing a search for an individual at a subscription website.

FAMILYSEARCH.ORG - Speaker: Ralph Seversen

It's time once again for an update on what is new and how to navigate our way through FamilySearch.org's vast archives...and nobody does this better than Ralph Seversen.

We know this website can provide valuable clues and information that will answer questions and lead us to further understand and know our ancestors - but, sometimes finding those clues or that specific information can be a little difficult.

We are hoping this presentation will help you better find your way through the website and discover some valuable information relating to the ancestors in your family tree.

Looking Back at January:

Karla Henderlong and Madeline Yanov presented a very detailed and information-packed program on researching early tax records. These records, where available, are terrific for finding your ancestors in the years between the censuses, especially prior to the 1900's. Tax records are a great substitute for missing census records and also for missing information about an ancestor prior to the 1790 census. One or both of

these lovely ladies are available to help you research at the Oakland FHC every Wednesday. You might want to take advantage of this opportunity.

Looking Back at February:

Sheila Wells Harris from Harris Funeral Home in Berkeley was as excited to meet us as we were to meet her. We both had many questions for each other. I was surprised at how many members of the audience had not thought to search for funeral home/mortuary records!

ITEMS OF INTEREST

Linkpendium.com: This site was originated by the originators of RootsWeb, I believe. It is quite a huge collection of data that can lead you to sites or indexes to trace your ancestors.

I clicked first on US sources, then on Colorado, then on Custer County - you can also search world wide sources. I was amazed at the leads I found - including a death date and place of burial for a child who I knew had died in Colorado but did not know the date!

Some of the leads will have \$ after them - well, we all know what that means. However, if you are searching at the FHC you can make a note of that particular site and log onto it to find the information. Give **Linkpendium.com** a try and hopefully you will be as lucky as I was.

California Obituary and Cemetery Databases: Google the *Hemit-San Jacinto Genealogical Society* to search their databases of obituaries and cemetery listings which covers the cities of Hemit and San Jacinto in the San Jacinto Valley in southwest Riverside County, CA. This information was collected from three or four local newspapers by their volunteers.

Google *Ivy Lawn Memorial Park & Funeral Home, Ventura, CA* to search their database. There are more than 50,000 persons buried at Ivy Lawn cemetery, established in 1917. Between 1917 and the 1960s many persons were relocated to Ivy Lawn from the Springfield and Ventura cemeteries. Click the Records link at the top of the page to access the search page. Click the Name link to view a photograph of the gravestone. (The above items both excerpted and edited from The Weekly Genealogist, Vol. 19, No. 1, Whole #773, January 6, 2016)

RESEARCHING IN ALAMEDA COUNTY CALIFORNIA Part 4: Vital Records, Civil Court Records, Criminal Records, Property Records

Buildings holding all of the above records are located in downtown Oakland, CA near the shore of Lake Merritt and within easy walking distance of each other and the Oakland Main Library.

Vital Records: County Recorder's Office, 1106 Madison Street, Oakland, CA 94607

Ph: 510-272-6362 for long distance callers: 1-888-280-7708

Open Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

You will need to show identification to search available indexes on microfilm and you will not get a certified copy of a vital document unless you can prove next of kin. But, you can receive an "information only" copy. Some information may be redacted. Their records date from 1905 to date. It is possible to search the following indexes on microfilm:

Births: 1940+ Deaths: 1960+ Marriage: 1971+

These documents keep rising in price...do your homework well. Be prepared to pay \$20-30 a copy, as of this date.

The Oakland Main Library History Room has early original birth and death records for the city of Oakland dating from 1880's to 1904. These copies can be had for the price of a Xerox copy! Keep in mind, what was considered the city of Oakland at that time was only a fraction of it's current area.

The Oakland Main Library Newspaper Room has marriage indexes on microfilm for 1960 to 1985. For earlier dates you might want to check the California Information File, 1904 - 1959, (an index of early local newspapers on microfiche) also available in the Newspaper Room for newspaper death notices.

East Bay Genealogical Society created an obituary file dating from mid 1986 through 2010 of obituaries clipped from local newspapers; primarily Oakland Tribune and Alameda Times Star, though there are many obituaries in this file for other cities within the county. This three set card file was donated to the Oakland History Center, though one set has been destroyed. However, the **entire three set card file** was filmed and the information can be found on **familysearch.org** with a name search.

WorldVitalRecords.com also contains some Alameda County vital records and indexes.. It can be accessed for free at the Family History Center Library or from home with an Alameda County Library Card.

Civil Court Records: Located in the Records Management office in the basement of the Administration Building, 1221 Oak Street, Oakland, CA 94612, Room 16B, Attn: County Recorder's Office.

You can search the computer index for probate, divorce or other civil case files. Early records are on microfilm and readers are available. Copies cost 50 cents per page.

If you cannot find what you feel certain should be there and it is fairly recent, ask the clerk. The information may be in either the Pleasanton or Hayward courthouse.

The **Assessor's Office**, if you are interested in researching tax records, is also located in this building on the main floor.

Property Records: To research deeds, mortgages, liens and also power of attorney, notary and fictitious business names: go to the County Recorder's Office, 1106 Madison Street, Oakland, CA, 94607. An immediate right turn as you enter the door will take you to the area where you may view their microfilms. There are helpful staff members there to assist you. Copies can be requested while you wait. Cost 75 cents per page as of this date.

Criminal Court Records: These are located in the main Courthouse at 1225 Fallon Street. Located between 12th and 14th Streets, the entrance is actually on 12th Street. As you enter the courthouse, the Criminal Court Records office is immediately to your right - after going through "check-point" of course. There is a microfiche index and probably some old bound indexes. Clerks are helpful. Readers are available and copies can be made for you.

We Rode the Orphan Trains, by Andrea Warren

Found this great little book at a local book sale. It was written for middle school-age children, so it is a quick, easy read.

Between 1854 and 1929 it is estimated 200,000 children journeyed west on the Orphan Trains organized in New York City by the Children's Aid Society.

The author includes much history of the Orphan Trains and the agents that accompanied these children during their journey. She interviewed eight living persons who tell the stories of their lives of having been orphans riding these trains. There are also many photographs in the book.

We have heard such sad tales of the Orphan Trains over the years, and I am sure there were many. However, this book relates mostly fortunate circumstances for the children interviewed. These frightened, lonely, bewildered little children showed much courage and strength throughout their ordeals.

All the interviewees have devoted their later years to speaking to school children and community groups about their experiences.

Andrea Warren is also the author of "Orphan Train Rider: One Boy's True Story", which I realize I have also read, though several years ago. It, too, was very interesting.
